2025 ONE DAY FIRST TIME HOMEWORK

We encourage all of our One Day Students and families to complete the following homework before attending the State Class. This homework is intended to enhance students' ability to engage in the One Day Class; however, it will not be graded.

If you are attending a class in a state other than your own, you will need to do the homework for the state where you are attending, not the state where you live. For example, if you live in Idaho but are attending the Washington State Class, you need to do the homework for Washington.



NOTE FOR NEBRASKA STUDENTS

Students attending a class in Nebraska should complete the homework packets made for Nebraska, which can be found at teenpact.com/homework. **Do not complete** the homework below if you are attending the Nebraska State Class.

Memorize 1 Timothy 2:1-3 using a Bible translation of your choice.

- ★ Be sure to bring your Bible to class!
- ★ **Purpose: To develop a biblical worldview of citizenship.**



HOMework TIP

Parents, look for creative ways to help your student memorize and understand these verses—games, flash cards, etc.

Write a one-page bill on an issue (serious or fun!) that you are willing to discuss.

- ★ Check out the Sample Bill (page 4) to see the correct format to use when writing your bill.
- ★ Bring two copies of your bill: one to turn in and one to keep for your own use during the class.
- ★ Please choose topics that are respectful and appropriate for the age and environment of the class.
- ★ **Purpose: To develop a better understanding of the legislative process.**



HOMework TIP

Parents, it's appropriate for you to assist your student with this process. Help them write about the topic of their choice—something that an 8-12-year-old would find interesting to talk about. Have fun with it!

Complete the Campaign Fact Sheet (page 5) to learn more about the election process and the people involved in running a campaign.

- ★ Bring one copy of your Campaign Fact Sheet to reference during class.
- ★ **Purpose: To learn more about the campaign process.**

HOMEWORK TIP

Parents, you can make this a great family learning experience by reading this out loud to your student or having them read it out loud to you. Continue the learning by talking through the questions at the end of each chapter.

With your parent's help, write an encouraging letter to both your state senator and state representative/delegate/assembly member (state, not federal).

- ★ Refer to the Sample Letter (page 6) when formatting your letters.
- ★ Need to know where to send the letters? Go to Open States (openstates.org) and search for your state senator and state representative, delegate, or assembly member.
- ★ Thank them for serving in the government and tell them about one issue or idea you think is important in your state.
- ★ Tell them you will be coming to the Capitol to learn about the government. They may want to meet you after class!
- ★ Take time to pray for your elected officials by name before sending your letters.
- ★ Mail the letters at least two weeks before the class to ensure they arrive in time.
- ★ If preferred, it is also acceptable to send your letters via email.
- ★ **Purpose: To develop a better understanding of the legislative process and to encourage your legislators.**



HOMEWORK TIP

Be respectful and address them with their proper titles, and remember to check your grammar and spelling!

Sample Bill

This is a standard format to follow when writing your bill for TeenPact Legislature. Each state legislature has their own design for their bills. Take a look at a bill from your state to check out the similarities and differences.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT	
Motorist Safety Act of 2025 ←	Title
PURPOSE: To reduce the number of deaths and severe injuries caused by traffic accidents. ←	Reasons you think this bill is important.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF (your state name)	
Section 1. For the purpose of this act, “motorist” shall mean any person controlling a motorized vehicle used for the purpose of moving persons or freight on the highways of this state. ←	The actual specific law that you want to pass with all the details spelled out. This will include definitions, plan of action, and means of enforcement.
Section 2. It is unlawful for a motorist to travel at a speed of more than 65 miles per hour on an interstate or more than 55 miles per hour on any other highway in this state.	
Section 3. Any person who violates this act shall be subject to a fine not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per violation.	
Section 4. All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.	
Section 5. This act shall become effective 30 days after approval by the governor or upon its otherwise becoming a law. ←	State exactly when your bill will take effect if passed.
Section 6. Upon approval by the governor, this bill will be reviewed by the Appropriation Committee for funding. ←	State how your bill will be funded.
